## Post-Op Instructions: After Receiving Crown Treatment

## Here are some instructions to make sure you take care of your tooth properly.

If you have received this sheet, it is because you had a crown appointment today.

Here are some instructions to make sure you take care of yourself properly.

- 1. Your tooth was numbed today and you should avoid eating or drinking hot beverages until the feeling returns (1-1.5 hrs).
- 2. You can consume cold beverages. A smoothie is a great option for some nourishment.
- 3. Your tooth and gums will likely be sore for a few days due to being worked on.
- 4. You may want to consider swishing with some warm salt-water to cleanse the area.
- 5. Please take care of your Crown Do not eat anything sticky or overly crunchy for at least 12 hours
- 6. A sticky food like gum or sweets might pull it off the crown in the first 12 hours. Something really crunchy like almonds might crack the material.
- 7. When flossing the crown for the first 48 hours, floss down the tooth as normal, but instead of pulling your floss up and possibly dislodging the crown; pull your floss out to the side of the tooth.
- 8. If the crown cracks or comes loose please contact the surgery ASAP.
- 9. If your Crown feel "high" or "tall" and hurts or feels weird to bite down on then please contact the surgery ASAP
- 10. You will need to care for this tooth like any other tooth, it needs to be brushed and flossed. The dental crown itself cannot get a cavity, but there is still tooth structure where the crown ends and your tooth begins again. You can get tooth decay there if you do not care for this tooth.
- 11. Like almost all dental treatment Crowns will usually eventually fail but can last a long time with proper care including regular examinations and effective personal dental hygiene. However, like any man made material, it will wear out with time and need replacement

REMEMBER if you have an emergency and you can't contact us and it involves

Swelling effecting the throat, tongue or airway;
Blockage effecting the throat, tongue or airway;
Rashes anywhere on your body after treatment
Rashes anywhere on your body after taking medication
Severe pain
Bleeding that does not stop with pressure
Bleeding that continues for more than 2 hours after treatment
Bleeding that worries YOU
